I am pleased to present the annual report for the Deer Park-Silverton Joint Fire District. As in years past, this report is intended to highlight items of interest to the public and does not detail all day-to-day activities conducted by our employees.

I am incredibly proud of the employees of this Fire District for their dedication to our communities and our fire department. As stated in previous reports, the men and women of the department are the backbone of our organization. Without them, we could not provide the high-quality EMS and fire services our communities deserve and have come to expect. In 2024, they responded to 3,719 calls for service, marking the second busiest year for the Fire District. In addition to emergency details, they participated in daily training, station and equipment maintenance, safety inspections, and community events. Many of these activities are done behind the scenes but are essential to delivering fire and emergency medical services.

As we prepare to enter our 26th year as a Fire District, I want to express my pride in this department's accomplishments. They are the result of our employees' hard work and dedication, the support of the Fire Board, and, most importantly, the support of our residents. I particularly want to thank the firefighters, EMTs, and paramedics who continue to demonstrate their dedication to this community.

I look forward to our continued successes in 2025 and beyond.

2024 Significant Incidents

The Fire District responded to two structure fires in Golf Manor early in the year. The first fire occurred on January 11 at 6338 Mayflower. Crews arrived to find smoke pushing from the gable vent on the north side of the house. The fire was contained to a small portion of the attic, though water damage from extinguishment efforts damaged the first and second floors. Damage to property and contents was estimated at \$32,000.

The second fire in Golf Manor occurred on February 15 at 6923 Hammel. Arriving crews found a working fire in the kitchen in the rear of the home. The fire was contained to the kitchen area, but there was smoke damage throughout the first floor. The fire was caused by an unattended pot of scented oil heating on the stove. Damage to property and contents for this fire was estimated at \$49,000.

We assisted Madeira-Indian Hill Joint Fire District and Sycamore Township at three structure fires in May, showcasing our commitment to mutual aid. The first fire was on May 6 at 6229 Lakota in Madeira for a structure fire in the home's garage. The second fire was on May 7 at 4551 Sycamore Road in Sycamore Township for a house struck by lightning. The third fire occurred on May 22 at 7320 North Timberland, suspected to have been caused by a lightning strike. Notably, there were no injuries to civilians or firefighters at these fires, a testament to our joint efforts.

On the evening of June 7, units were dispatched to 6721 Stoll Lane in Silverton for a reported structure fire. On arrival, the crew of Quint 89 discovered that they had a fully involved recreational vehicle approximately 20 feet from the residence. Crews from Sycamore Township Engine 92 and Madeira-Indian Hill Engine 65 assisted with extinguishment and overhaul. Except for a melted security camera, the house was not damaged. However, the RV, estimated at \$10,000 (including contents), was a total loss.

During the afternoon of June 15, Quint 89 was dispatched to 6315 Wiehe Road in Golf Manor for reports of smoke in the area. Before their arrival, the incident was upgraded to a possible structure fire due to multiple calls to the Hamilton County Communications Center reporting that a building at Mills Fence was on fire. Crews arrived on the scene and discovered the fire was not

in a building but in a large stack of palletized vinyl-coated chain link fencing. In addition to damaging the fencing, the flames also damaged a work truck parked next to the pallets. The fire loss was estimated at \$180,000.

A large tree fell onto a house at 6613 Plainfield Road in Silverton on July 10. There were residents present, and one person was briefly trapped on the second floor but was able to self-extricate before our arrival. The patient was transported to the hospital for evaluation of injuries sustained in the incident.

On September 27, the region was hit with high winds from the remnants of Hurricane Helene. In addition to our usual run volume, the staff responded to multiple reports of wires and trees down in our response area. Though trees struck two houses, the damage overall was not as significant as in other parts of Hamilton County.

Our mutual aid partners assisted us on the morning of December 17 with a reported kitchen fire at 2668 Vera Avenue in Golf Manor. The crew from Quint 89 quickly extinguished a stove and cabinets that were on fire in a first-floor apartment. The cause of the fire resulted from the range being left on and unattended by the resident.

ISO Evaluation

On September 4, a representative from the Insurance Services Office, Inc. (ISO) completed a Public Protection Classification (PPC) survey of the Fire District. In late November, we were notified that our PPC classification would remain at 3, a score we have had since 2012.

According to their letter, the PPC plays an important role in the underwriting process at insurance companies, and homeowners and businesses may see discounted insurance rates with higher PPC scores, with Class 1 being the best rating assigned by ISO. The graph below shows where the Fire District lies compared to over 38,000 fire departments across the United States.

I will uphold the standards of my profession, continually search for new and improved methods, and share my knowledge and skills with my contemporaries and successors.

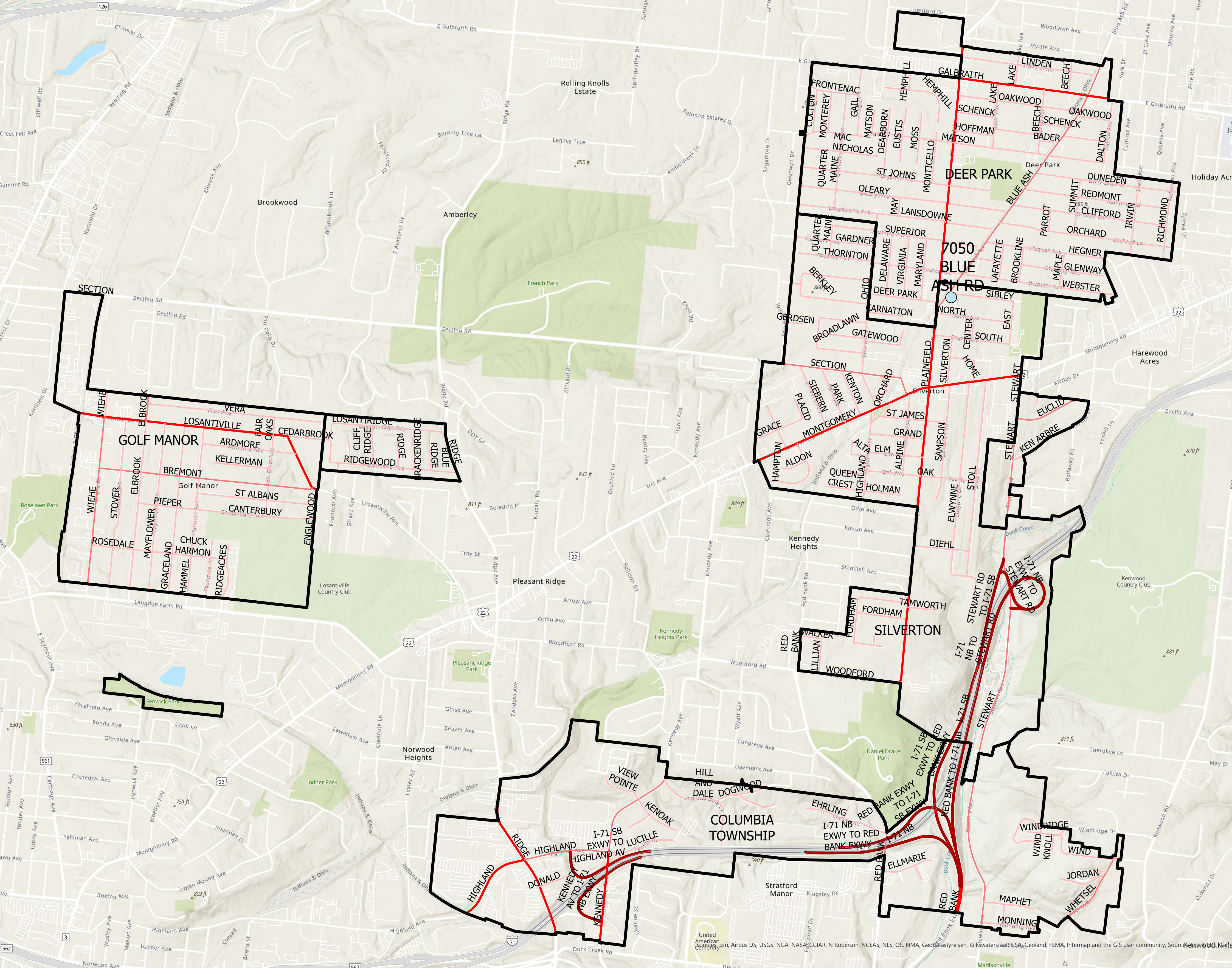
I will not allow personal feelings, nor danger to self, deter me from my responsibilities as a firefighter.

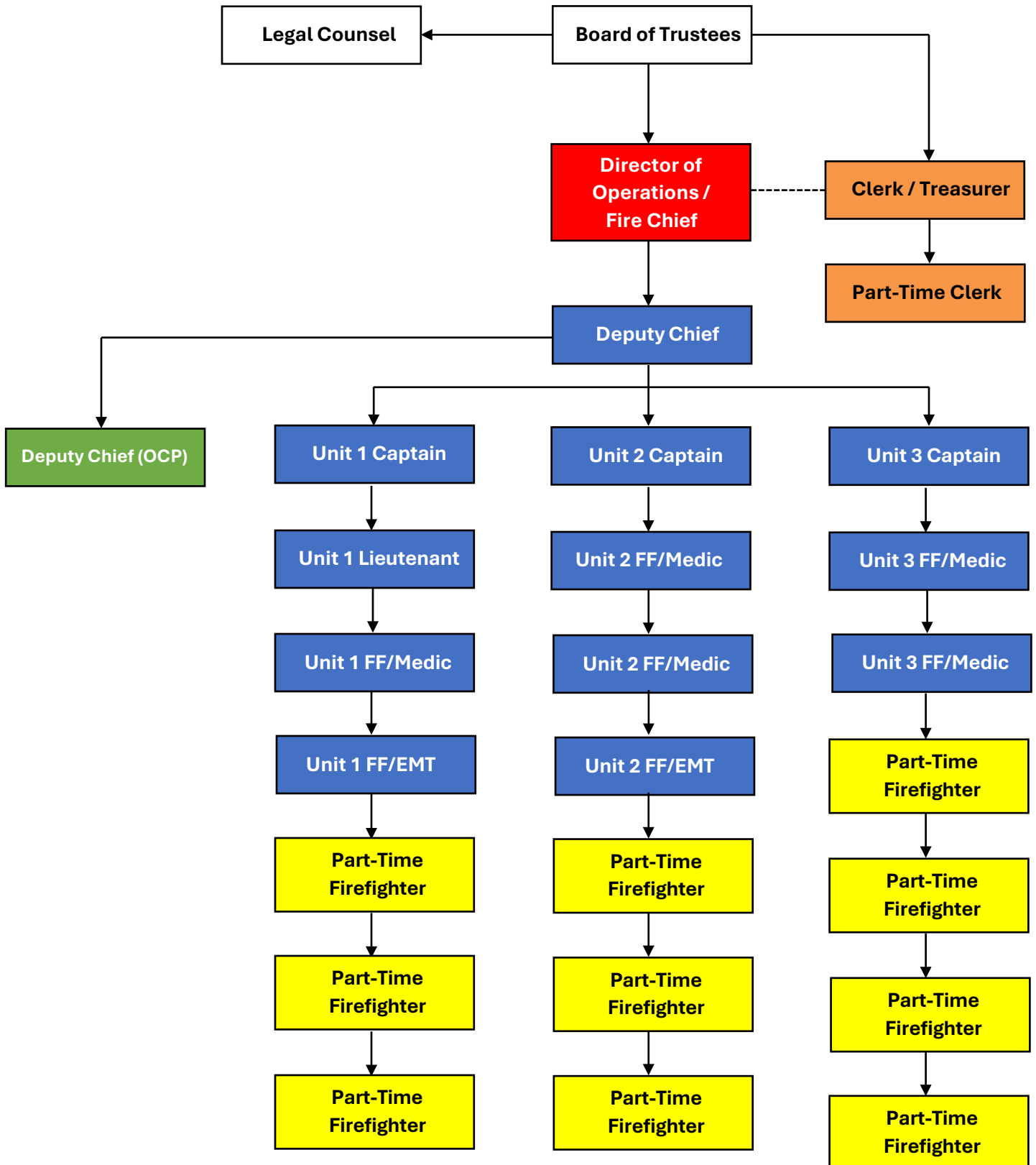

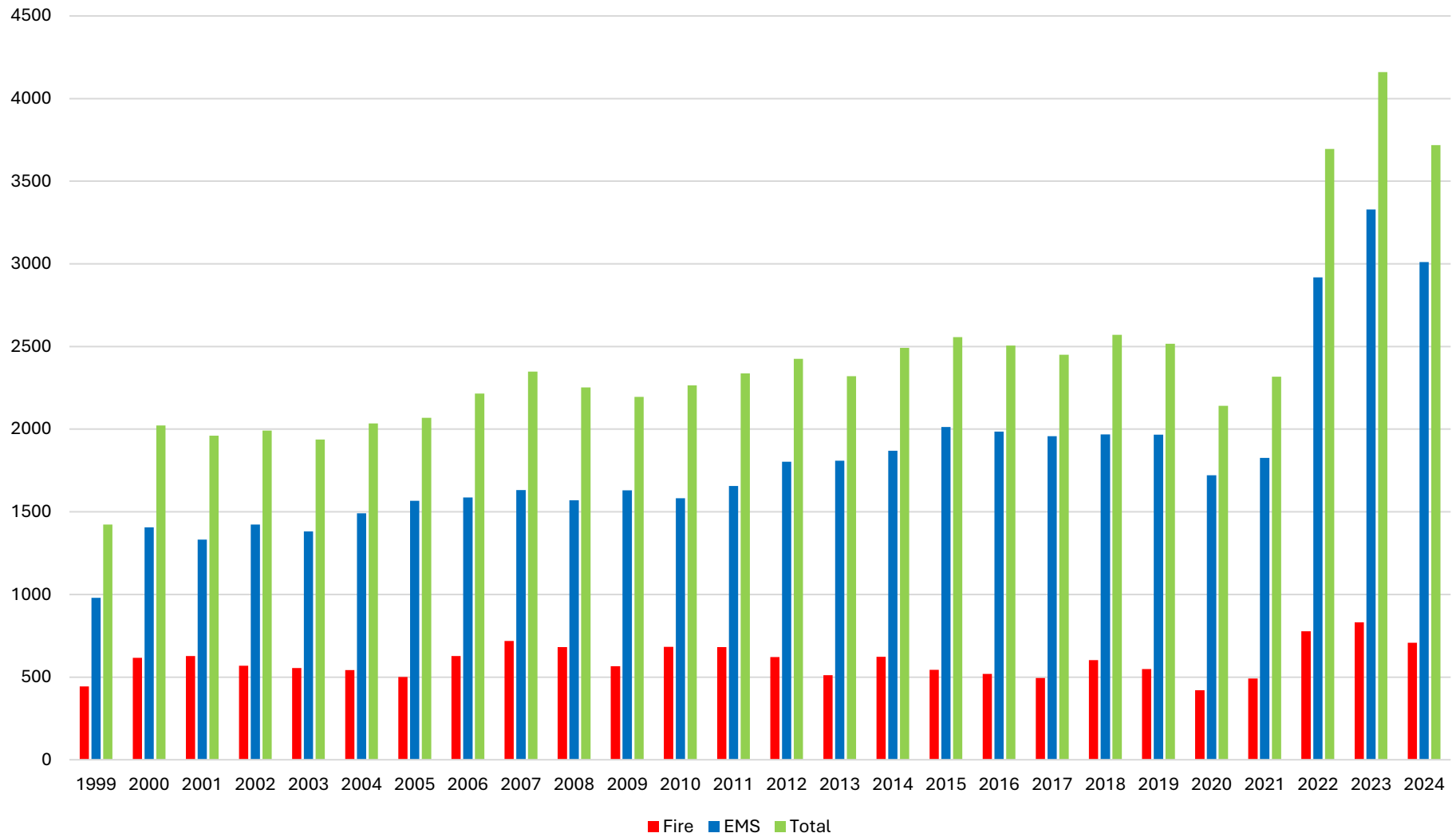

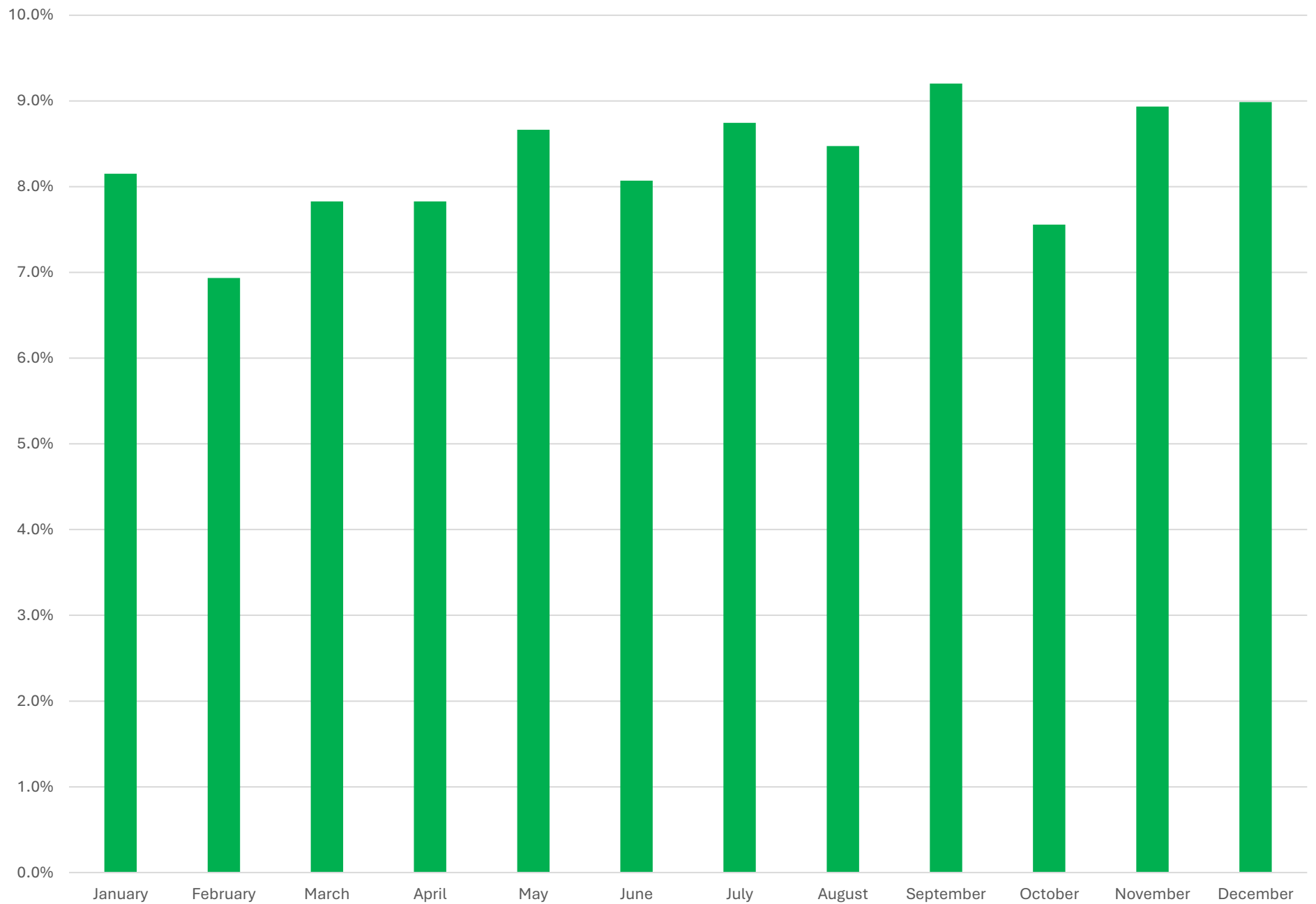

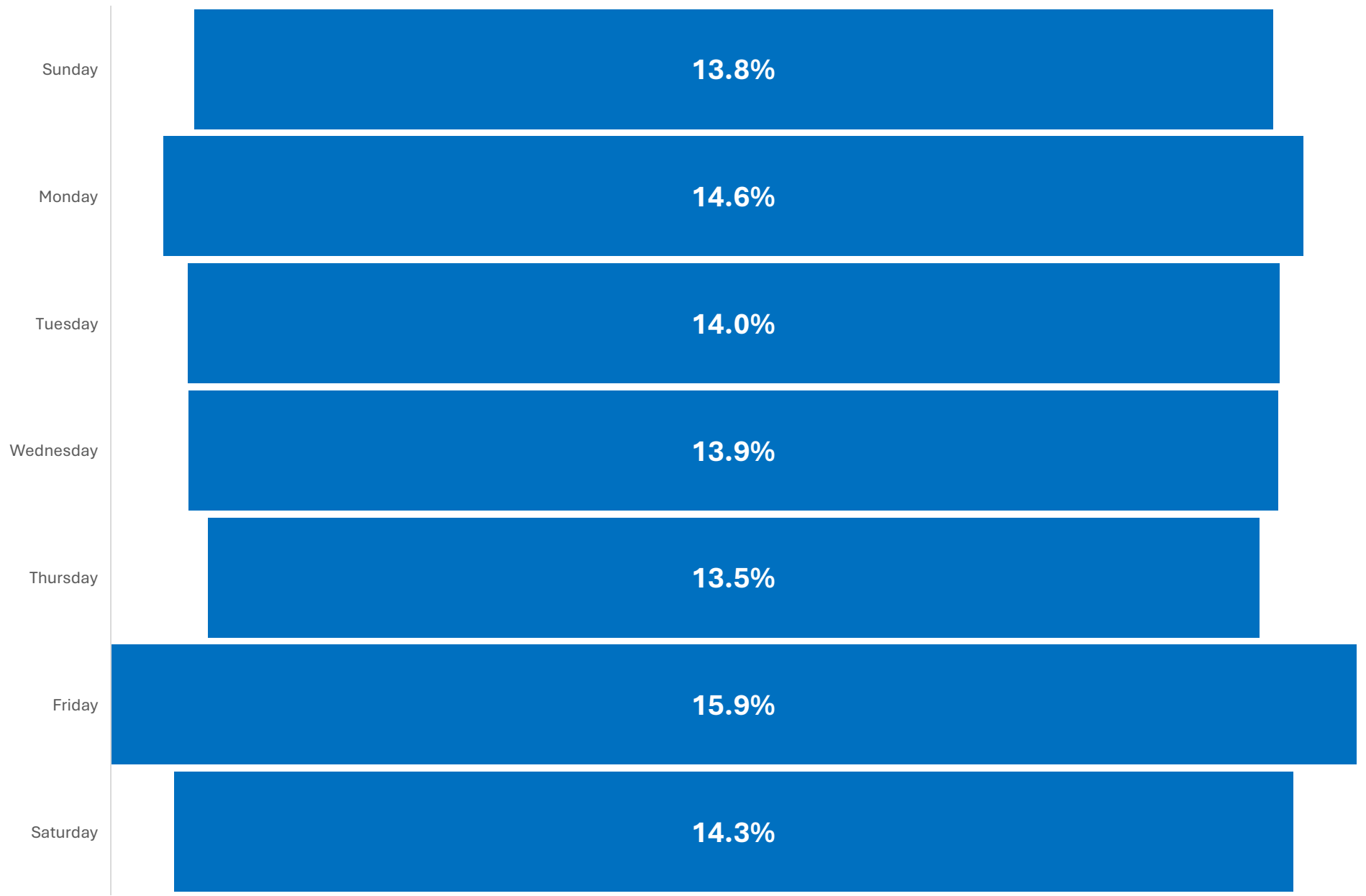
Fire and EMS Dispatch Trends by Year



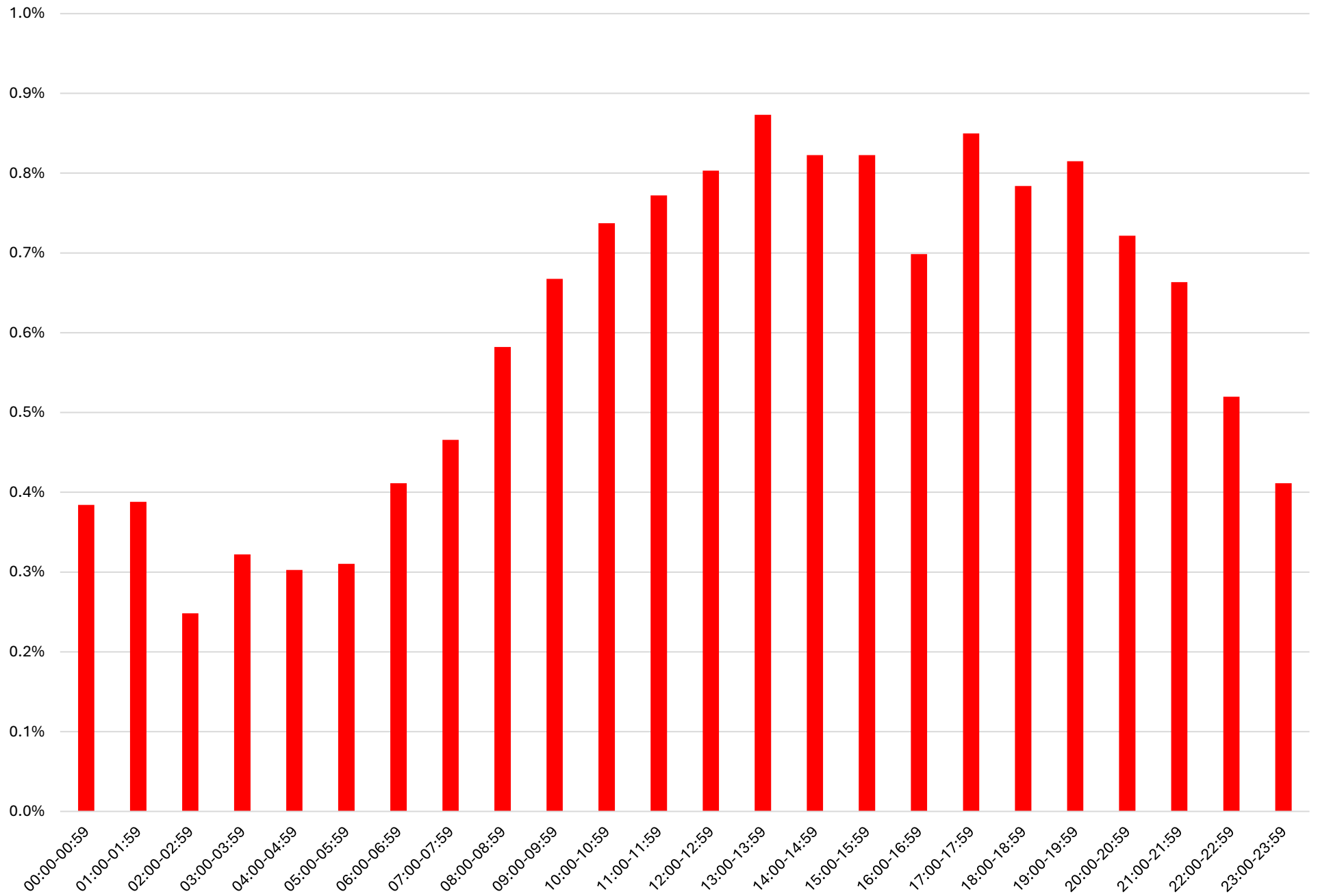
Dispatch by Month

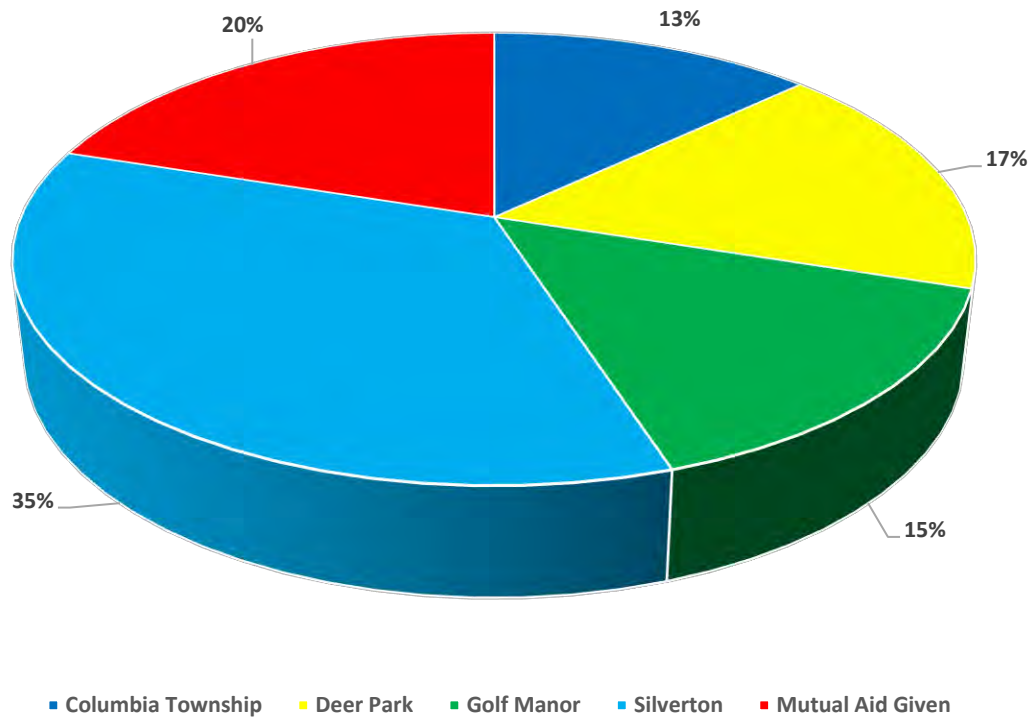
