SUBJECT: 2025 Annual Report

The year 2025 was one of reflection, planning, and progress for the Deer Park-Silverton Joint Fire District. Guided by our responsibility to provide reliable, high-quality fire and emergency medical services, the Fire Board and staff worked throughout the year to strengthen the District's operational readiness while planning carefully for the future needs of our community.

A central focus in 2025 was ensuring the Fire District's long-term financial sustainability. Our most recent operating levy was approved in 2013. Since that time, operating costs have continued to rise while levy revenues have remained fixed. Through disciplined financial management, along with EMS insurance billing, grant funding, and service contracts with neighboring communities, the District has maintained service levels while limiting taxpayer impact. However, it became increasingly clear that additional funding would be necessary to continue meeting community expectations in the years ahead.

After extensive review and discussion, the Fire Board placed an additional 3.5-mill operating levy on the November 2025 ballot. The purpose of the levy was to sustain current services and plan responsibly for future needs, including the replacement of fire and EMS vehicles, facility improvements, technology upgrades, and ongoing efforts to recruit and retain qualified personnel. In November, residents of Deer Park and Silverton strongly supported this effort, with nearly 70 percent of voters approving the levy. We are sincerely grateful for this vote of confidence and for the many residents and volunteers who helped inform the community throughout the process.

Operationally, 2025 brought meaningful improvements to the District's emergency response capabilities. After a multi-year production process, a new medic unit was placed into service, strengthening our ability to deliver timely and effective emergency medical care. Planning also continued for future

ambulance replacements to ensure continuity of service and responsible long-term budgeting. These investments reflect the District's commitment to readiness, safety, and reliability.

The District also continued to build and maintain strong partnerships. Productive conversations took place with municipal partners, including the Village of Golf Manor, as we look toward the future of cooperative service agreements. Regionally, the District shared its experience at the Hamilton County Shared Services Summit, highlighting the benefits of collaboration and the efficiencies achieved through shared services and contracts.

Our people remain the foundation of everything we do. In 2025, we celebrated professional accomplishments within the department, including the successful completion of advanced paramedic training by one of our firefighters. We also recognized the contributions of long-serving members who concluded their careers this year after decades of dedicated service. At the same time, the District continued its efforts to address staffing needs through recruitment and training, ensuring we are prepared to meet the demands of a growing and evolving community.

For more than 26 years, the Deer Park–Silverton Joint Fire District has been committed to fiscal responsibility, operational excellence, and community trust. The progress made in 2025 reflects not only careful planning by the Fire Board and staff, but also the continued support of the residents we are proud to serve.

As we move forward, we remain dedicated to protecting life and property, being responsible stewards of public resources, and strengthening the safety and resilience of our community. Thank you for your continued trust and support.

I will not allow personal feelings, nor danger to self, deter me from my responsibilities as a firefighter.

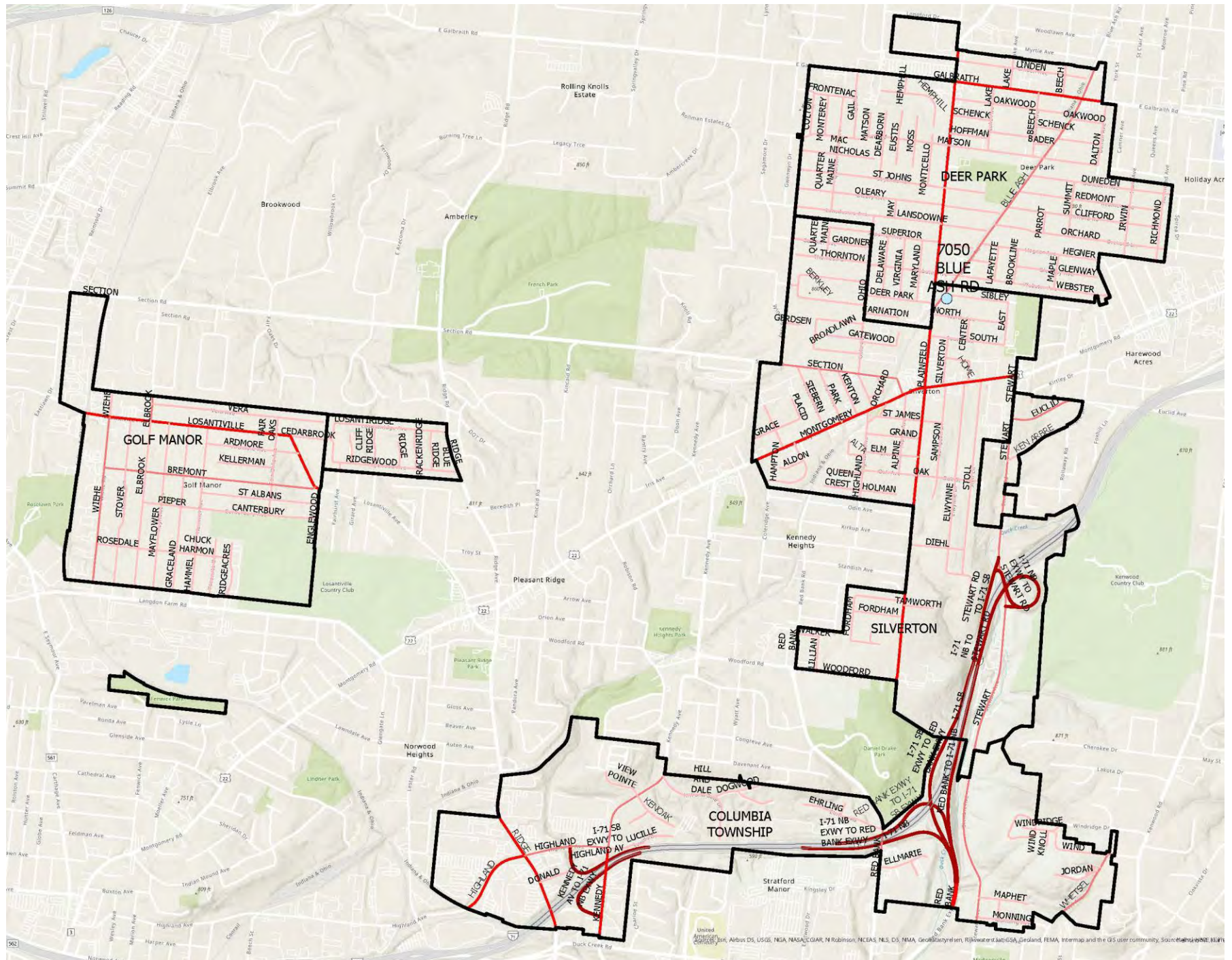
I will, at all times, respect the property and rights of all people, the laws of my community and my country, and the chosen way of life of my fellow citizens.

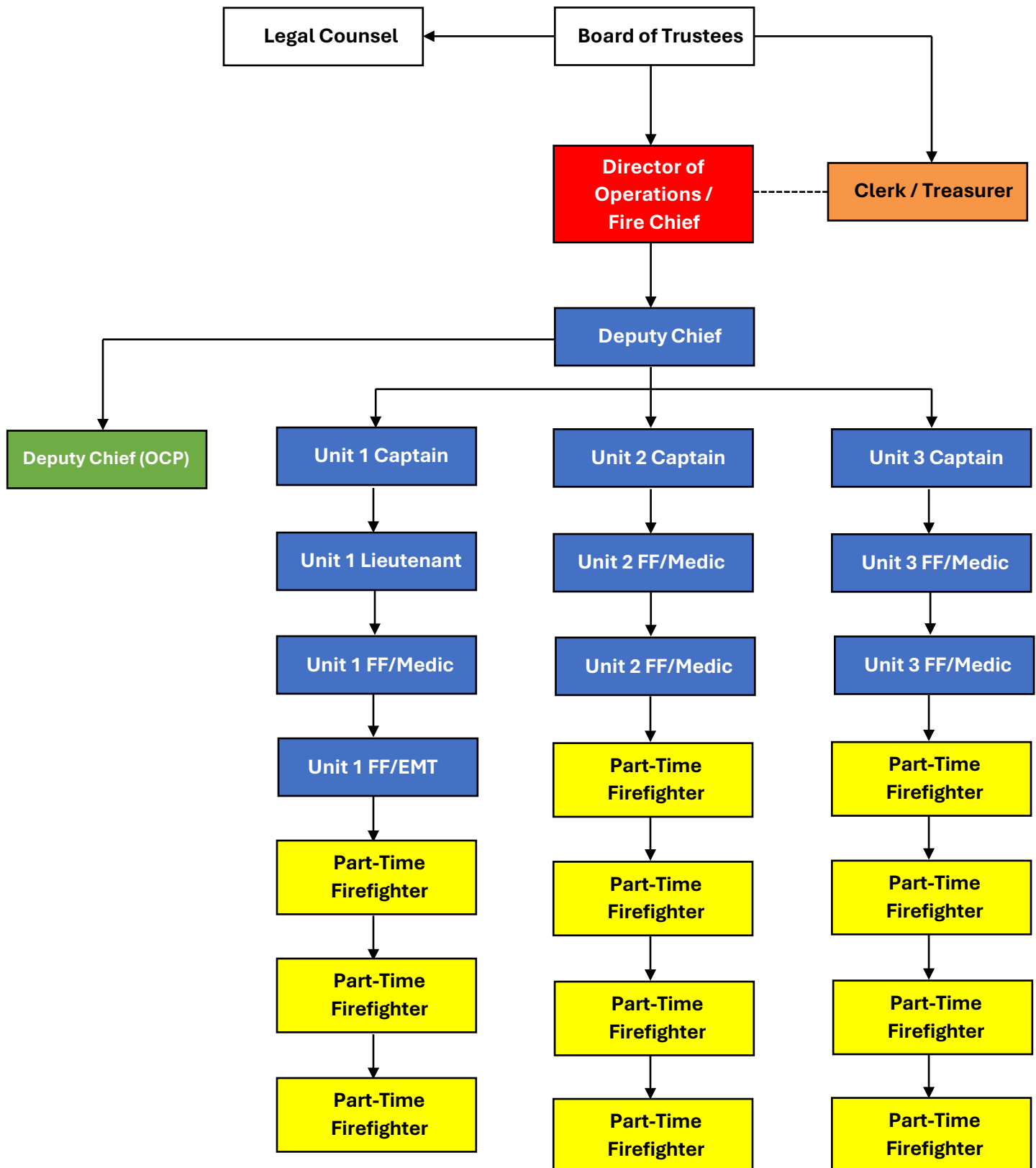

- Conducted 1,460 hours of in-house training led by fire and EMS instructors on our staff. This training covered 107 different topics.

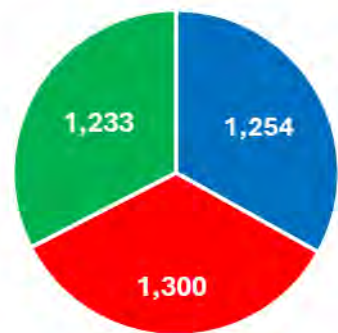

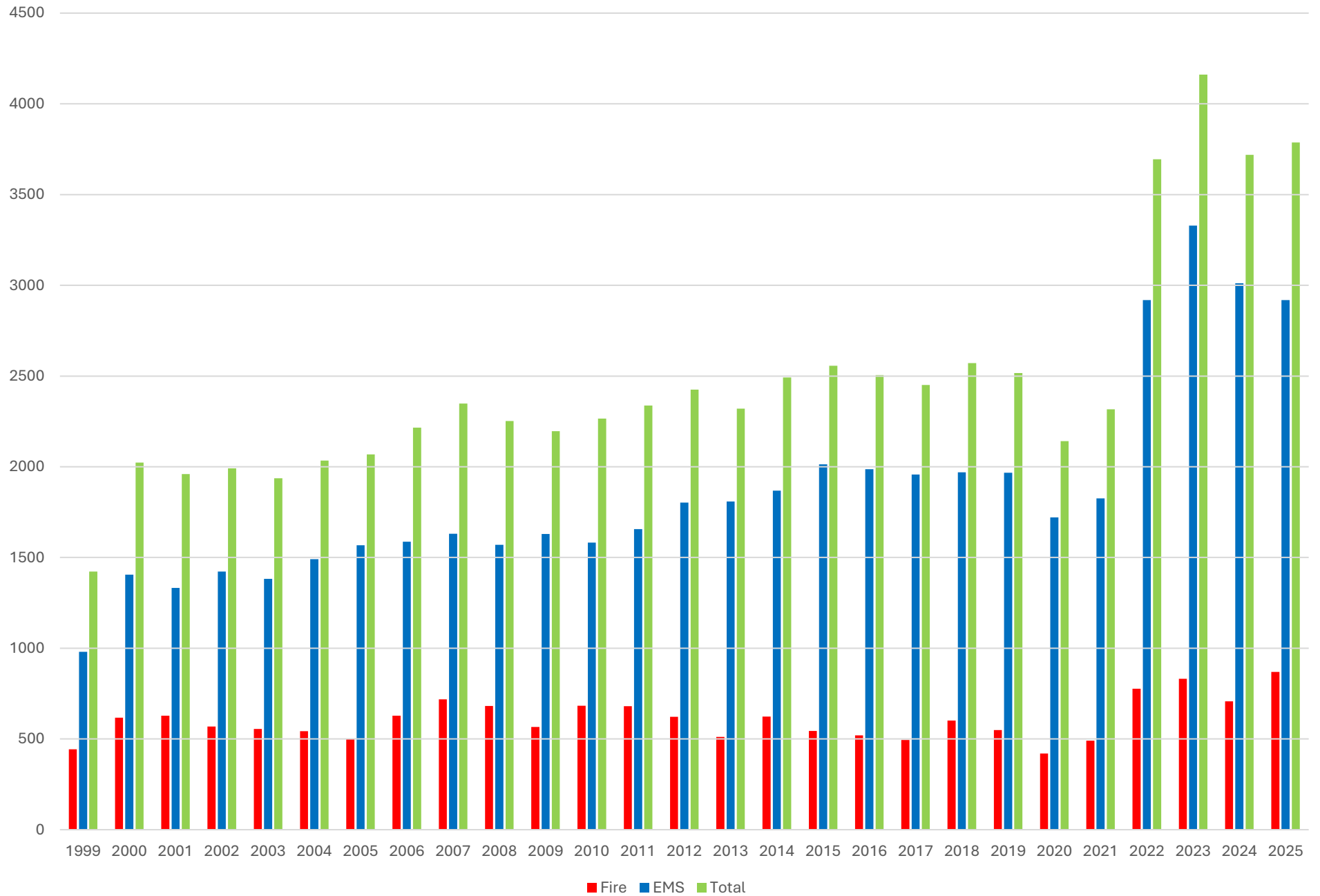

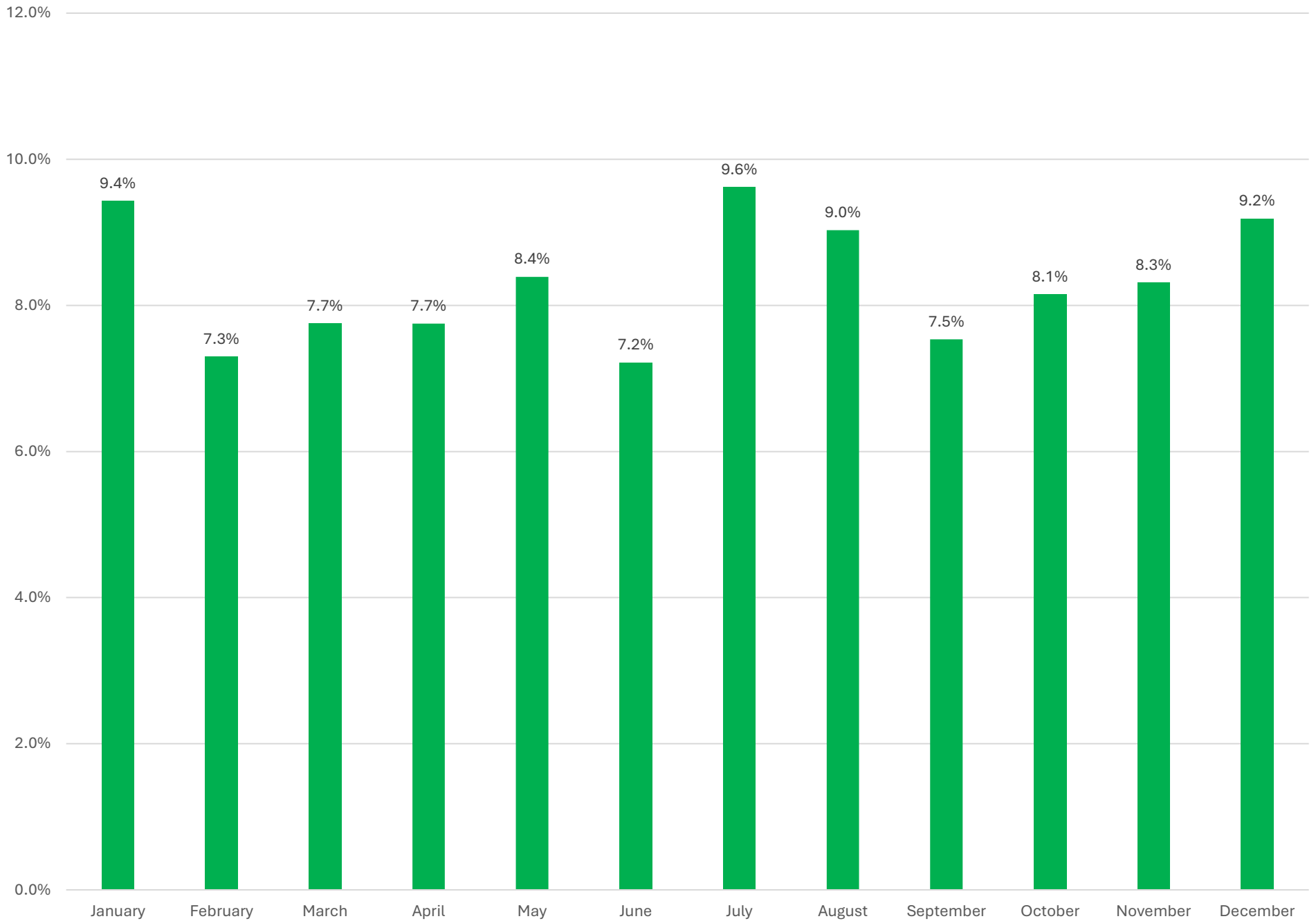

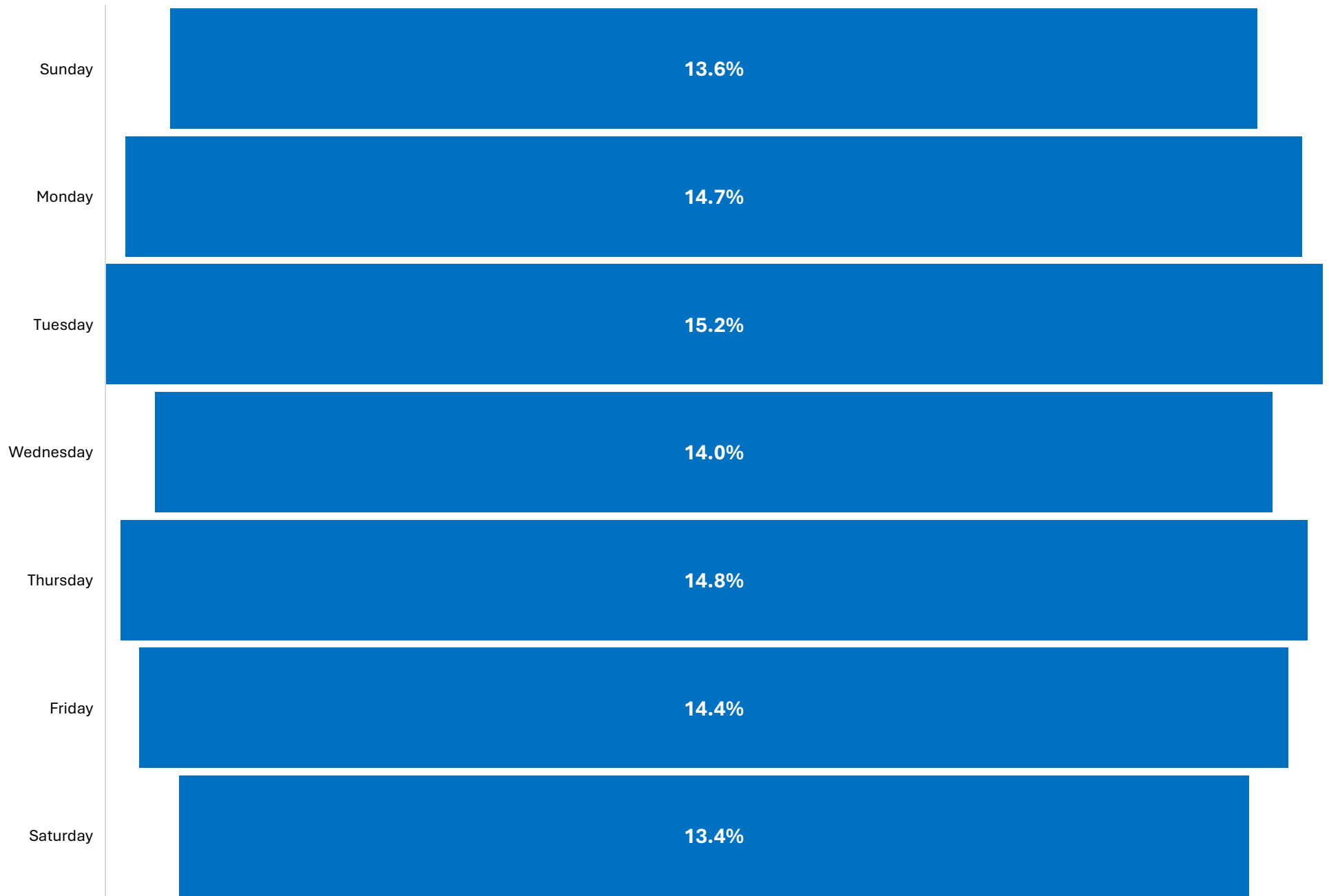
Fire and EMS Dispatch Trends by Year



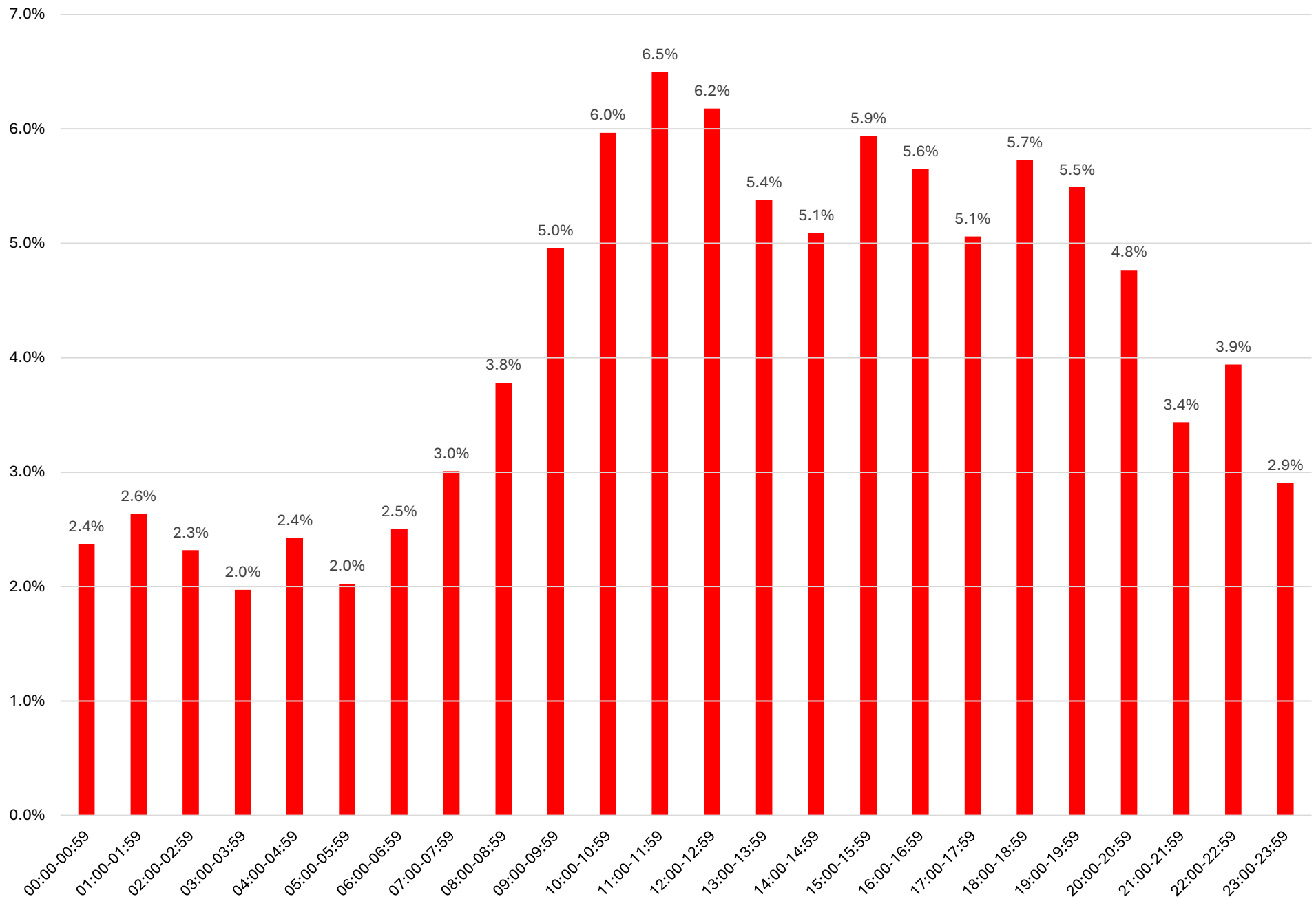
Dispatch by Month

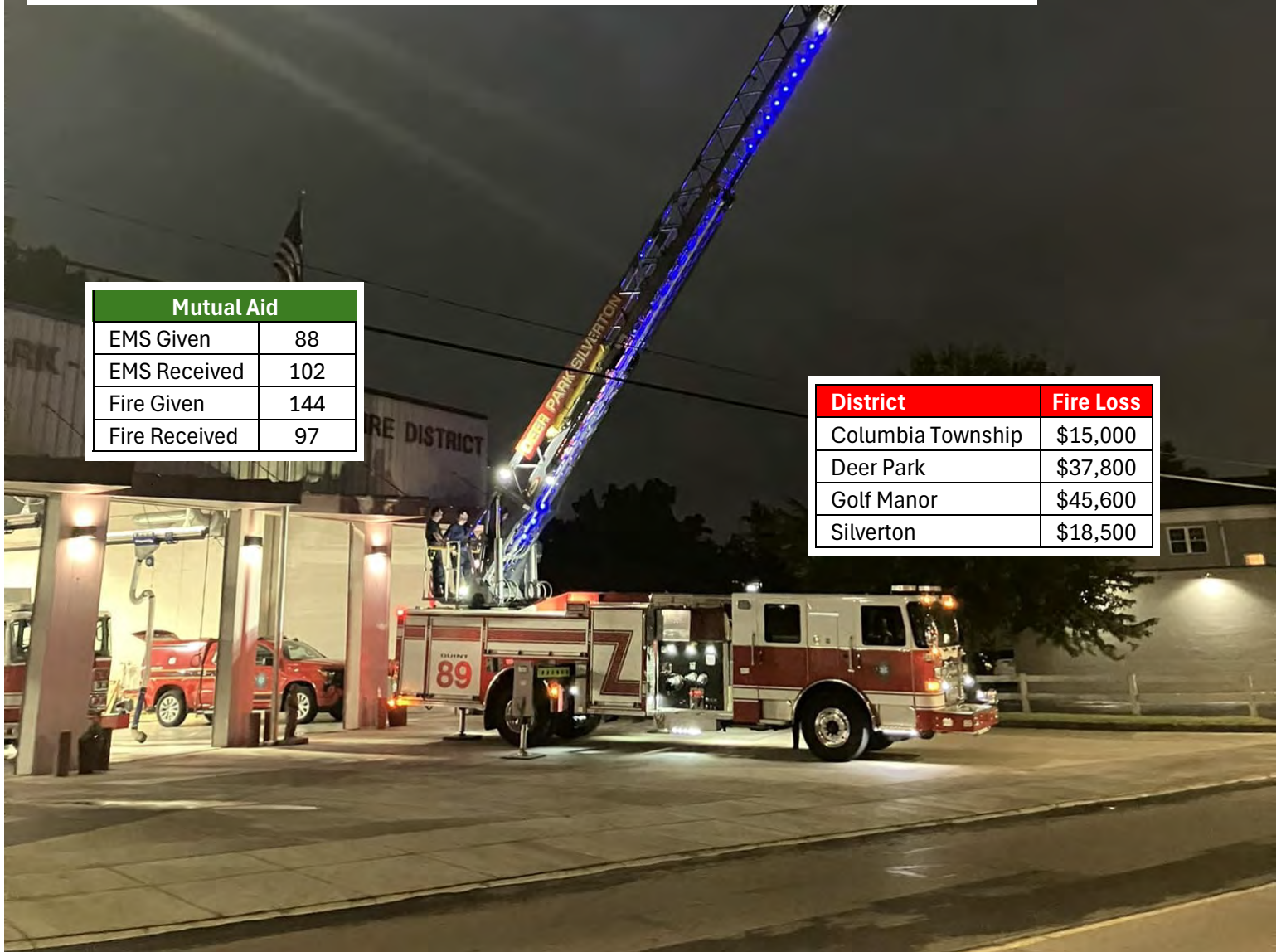

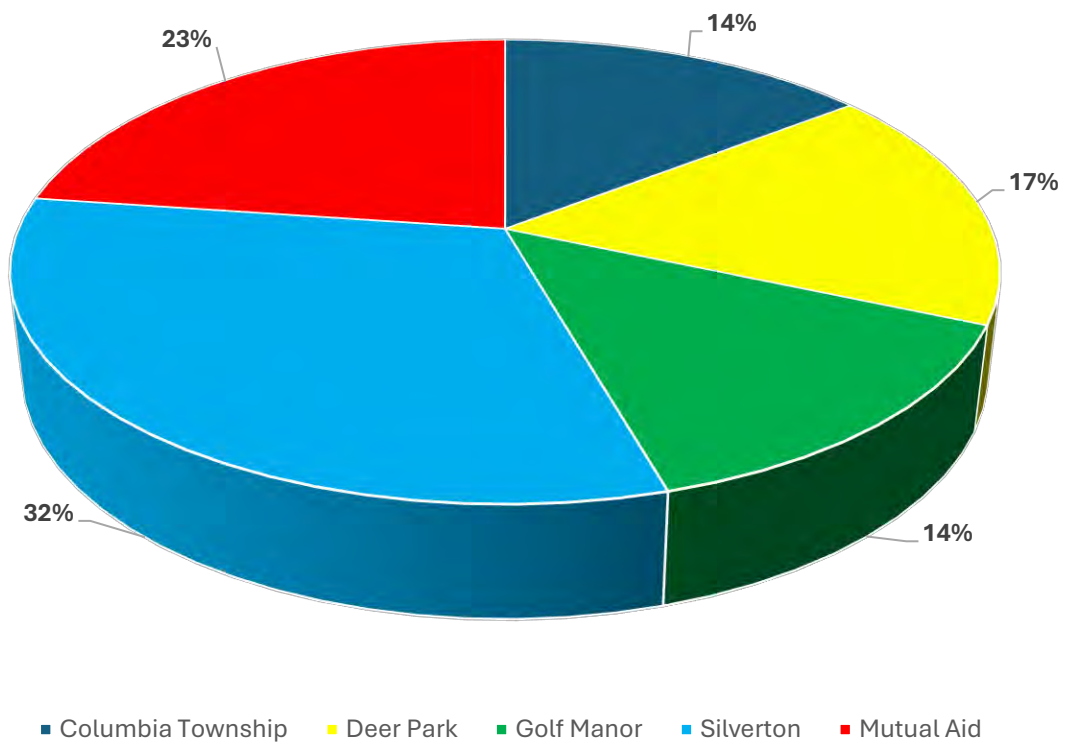

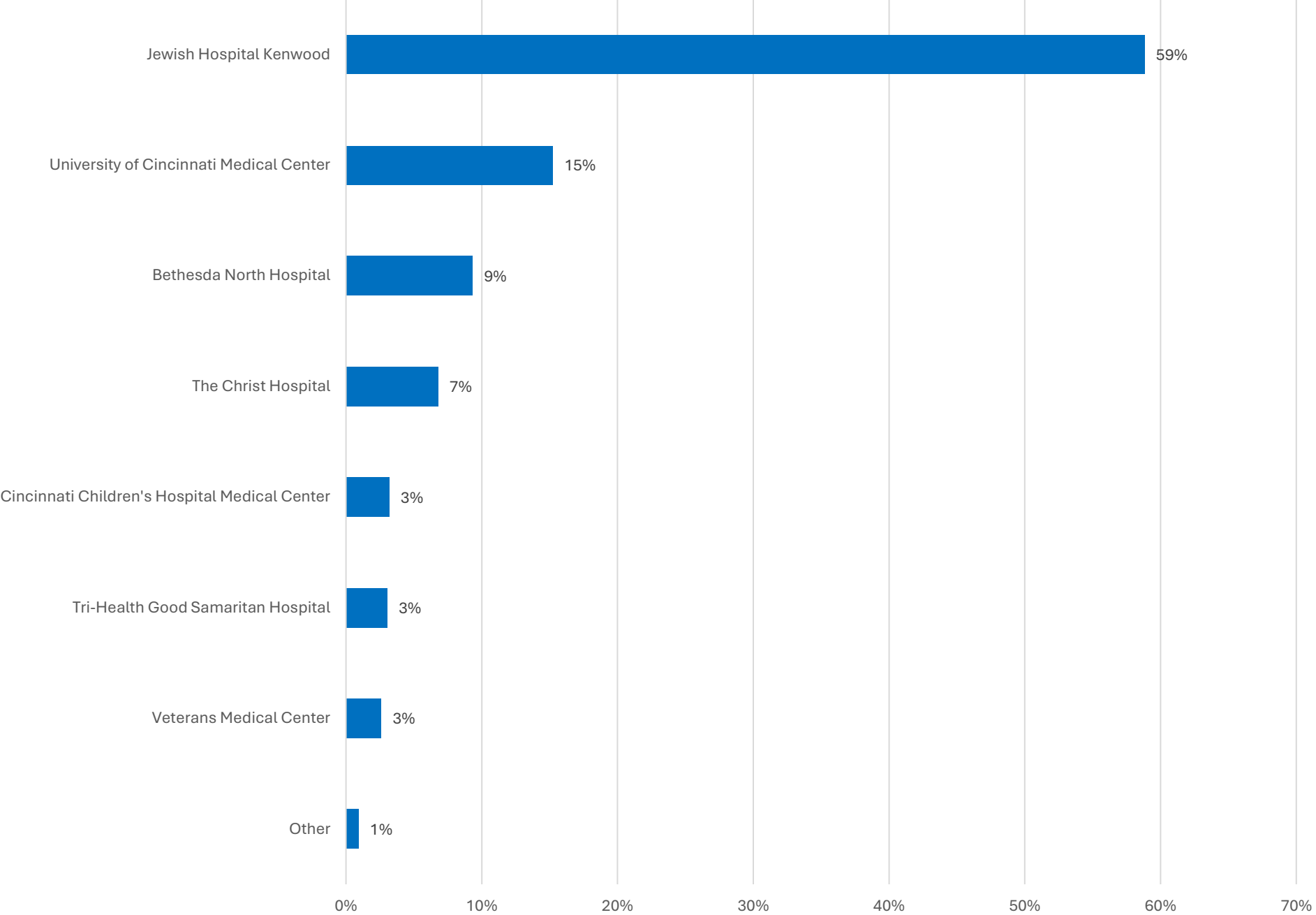
EMS Dispatch by District

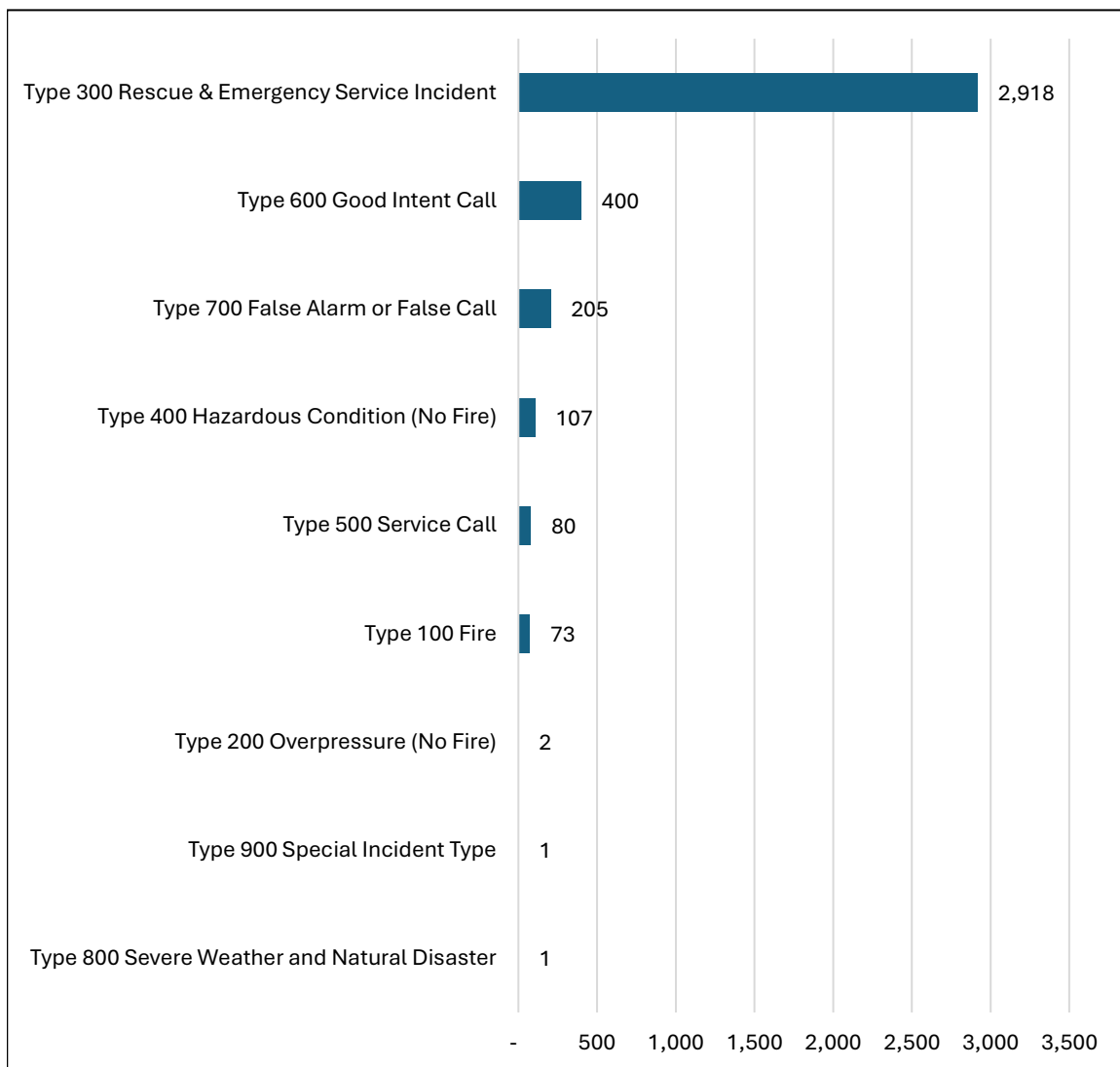
